From law-breakers to law makers

The nation goes to the polls from April 19 to June 1, to elect its representatives to the Lok Sabha, with the expectation that these new members of Parliament will serve them well. Therefore, the integrity of these elected representatives is of paramount importance, considering that they are entrusted with the responsibility of making decisions shaping the nation's future.

However, when individuals with criminal backgrounds or pending cases against them are elected to positions of power, it raises questions about the legitimacy and integrity of the political system. In India, as in many other countries, the presence of members of Parliament (MPs) with declared criminal cases has sparked widespread debate and concern.

Disturbingly though, data from the Association for Democratic Reforms

(ADR) reveals that the trend of MPs with criminal backgrounds seems to be escalating with every general election. Similarly, the proportion of MPs with serious criminal cases has also steadily risen over the years.

The Association for Democratic Reforms (ADR) is an apolitical

and non-partisan, non-profit organisation in India, dedicated to electoral and political reforms for over 25 years.

ADR filed a public interest litigation (PIL) with the Delhi High Court, regarding the disclosure of candidates' criminal, financial, and educational backgrounds when contesting elections. Based on this PIL, the Supreme Court made it mandatory for all candidates contesting elections to disclose their criminal, financial, and educational backgrounds before the polls, by filing an affidavit.

Their name is Bond, Team Electoral Bond Himanshi Dhawan, Times Network

f today, revelations about the donors who bought electoral bonds are a hot topic of discussion, much of the credit goes to a bunch of persistent civil society and RTI activists and a dogged legal team. Chief among them is a non-profit called the Association for Democratic Reforms (ADR), which filed a petition in 2017, soon after the electoral bonds scheme was announced in Parliament.

But few know that it all started 25 years ago with an innocuous message: "Please come to my room for a meeting." A group of

So, the BMC came up with the idea of introducing a digital mode of payment and police verification of marshals.

The online penalty platform was developed by the BMC's IT department.

They are equipped with a small printer connected to their mobile through Bluetooth. They can print the receipt of the penalty and the amount will be deposited in their

The marshals have the authority to impose fines ranging from Rs100 to Rs1,000 for littering. They are authorised to penalise individuals for illegal garbage and debris dumping, burning waste, spitting, littering, and not picking up pet waste.

High Court Raps State For Not Striving For Disabled-Friendly Footpaths

During the last hearing, the court had asked the government to list the steps taken to provide easy footpath access to the disabled.

he Bombay High Court rapped the Maharashtra government over the nonfunctional state advisory board constituted to frame policies under the Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act, 2016. It has asked the principal secretary or secretary of the department concerned to file an affidavit within two weeks.

Challenges In Footpath Accessibility For Disabled Notified In HC Hearing

The HC had taken a suo motu (on its own) cognisance



of the issue after it received an email from wheelchairbound Karan Shah, 25, highlighting the inaccessibility of footpaths, by people similarly placed as him, due to closely placed bollards. During the last hearing, the court had asked the government to list the steps taken to provide easy footpath access to the disabled.

The government informed a bench of Chief Justice DK Upadhyaya and Justice Arif Doctor that the board was constituted between 2016 and 2019. However, it does not have any non-official members as contemplated under the Disability Act. Notably, the board has met just twice thus far. The bench asked, "Why do you make such legislation if it cannot be followed? Is this legislation to be kept in bookshelves?"

HC Criticises State Disability Welfare Department Over Lack Of Board Meetings

Irked, the bench said, "Apart from two meetings, not even a single discussion was held for all these over four years? To activate the statutory board, do you need orders from the court? There is a statutory board which is not meeting even once?" It further reminded that the law mandated that the board must meet at least once every six months.

During the last hearing, the HC had asked the Metropolitan Region Development Authority and the Maharashtra State Road Development Corporation to strive for removal of bollards on roads under their limits. While the former agency assured to clear the obstruction in two months, the latter informed that there are only highways under its jurisdiction. Likewise, BMC counsel Anil Singh said that the BMC is working on the issue and the same will be addressed in a few months.
