RBI LAUNCHES UDGAM PORTAL TO TRACK UNCLAIMED DEPOSITS

RBI's UDGAM portal presents an innovative solution to the issue of unclaimed deposits by centralizing information and providing an intuitive search process

he Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has unveiled a ground-breaking solution for individuals seeking their unclaimed deposits. Named the UDGAM (Unclaimed Deposits – Gateway to Access Information) portal, this centralized web platform is designed to simplify the process of locating unclaimed deposits across various banks. Here's a comprehensive breakdown of the key features and steps involved:

The Purpose of UDGAM Portal

The RBI's UDGAM portal serves as a user-friendly tool for individuals to track down their unclaimed deposits seamlessly, consolidating information from multiple banks into a single accessible location. With the growing prevalence of unclaimed deposits, RBI has been proactively promoting awareness campaigns to educate the public about this issue. Through UDGAM, RBI aims to empower citizens to identify their unclaimed deposits and engage with their respective banks to initiate claims.

How UDGAM Works

The UDGAM portal simplifies



the process of identifying and claiming unclaimed deposits by streamlining the steps involved. RBI collaborated with Reserve Bank Information Technology Pvt Ltd (ReBIT), Indian Financial Technology & Allied Services (IFTAS), and select banks to develop this platform.

Currently, the UDGAM portal provides access to unclaimed deposit information from seven banks, including prominent names like State Bank of India, Punjab National Bank, South Indian Bank, Central Bank of India, Dhanlaxmi Bank, DBS Bank India, and CitiBank N.A. For other banks, the search feature will be introduced in phases by October 15, 2023.

Registration Process on UDGAM Portal

Getting started with the UDGAM portal is a straightforward process. Follow these steps to register and initiate your search for unclaimed deposits:

Generic drugs are a must in prescriptions Violations will lead to penalties and also suspension of licence

All doctors must prescribe generic drugs, failing which they will be penalised and also have their licence to practice suspended for a period, according to new regulations issued by the National Medical Commission (NMC).

Doctors should also avoid prescribing branded generic drugs, NMC said in its "Regulations Relating to Professional Conduct of Registered Medical Practitioners".

This comes against the backdrop of doctors being required to prescribe generic drugs, but not facing penal provisions for not doing so, according to the regulations issued in 2002 by the Indian Medical Council.

The new regulations issued by NMC highlighted that India's out-of-pocket spending on medications accounts for a major proportion of public spending on healthcare.

"Generic medicines are 30 to 80 per cent cheaper than branded drugs. Hence, prescribing generic medicines may overtly bring down healthcare costs and improve access to quality care," it said in the regulations notified on August 2.

NMC defined generic medicines as a drug product "comparable to brand / reference listed product in dosage form, strength, route of administration, quality and

performance characteristics, and intended use". A branded generic drug is one that has come off patent and is manufactured by drug



companies and sold under different companies' brand names.

The new regulations will benefit patients but will lead to a loss for doctors who have nexus with chemists outside hospitals premises.

"The implementation of the regulation in all hospitals is important. This need to be taken seriously by the government and hospital administration," said Dr Avinash Supe, former Dean, KEM hospital.

Generic drugs must in prescriptions

In case of violations, a doctor may be given a warning or instructed to attend a workshop or academic programme on ethics, personal and social relations and/or professional training, according to the regulations. If the violations are repeated, the doctor's licence to practice may be suspended for a particular period. contd. on Page 4

Hospital Healthcare Delivery Medicine Pilferage and Overcharging

ne of the very little known dark spots (there are many such dark spots) of hospital operations is the pilferage of medicines by Ward Boys and Nursing Staff. From the point of delivery from the Pharmacy Department to the Nursing Station and then to the Patient Bed, the medicines get flicked. The patient gets charged directly from the integrated computer system at Pharmacy Dept. He becomes aware of the medicines charged to him only after a few days when he receives the hospital bill. Secondly there is a very long list of medicines charged to him and it becomes nearly impossible for him to check the medicines billed vs actually administered to him. So no complaints as nobody knows. Due to the inherent weakness in this whole system, it was a daunting task to control this pilferage. After a detailed operations study at micro level, we implemented following system:

- 1 All medicines will be given to Ward boy in transparent bag for each Bed from Pharmacy Department
- 2 The bill for the medicines will be kept inside the transparent bag itself
- 3 The bag was sealed at the **Pharmacy Department**
- 4 Nursing Station was not allowed to open the bag and store the medicines with them. They were instructed to deliver the medicines directly to the patient bed without opening the bag.
- 5 At the patient bed, the bag was opened in the presence of the patient (wherever we say 'patient' we also mean 'relative of the patient' attending to him) after drawing his attention 6 The remaining medicines

along with the bills thereof were kept in a special medicine box at the bedside mini cupboard of the patient.

7 At the time of discharge of the patient, the nurses will specifically ask the patient to collect the remaining medicines from the drawer.

8 Every time after medicines are delivered to them, the Patient / relative will immediately receive an auto SMS about the medicine charged to his account with an advice to check the medicines with the bill kept in the bag.

9 Our Patient Relations Executives (PRE) will, from time to time, educate patients/relatives about this system and get their feedback. They will also make special effort to ensure that the patient / relative checks the drawers before leaving the room and takes all the unused medicines with them.

This system largely eliminated the problem of pilferage of medicines. However, patients were mostly unaware that in our hospital they were not overcharged for the medicines due to our tight systems control and in that sense we did not earn any extra mileage of goodwill. This was because, in the first place, they are not aware of the systems vulnerability to overcharging for the medicines (in terms of the quantity) in most of the hospitals as explained in the beginning. Actually in a way it adversely hit our profitability because the patients were now getting charged for medicines less than before. It was not prudent to educate the patients about this vulnerability for overcharging in other hospitals. Therefore, this little known secret remains a secret.

- **2. Register:** Fill in your mobile number, name, password, and the provided CAPTCHA. After completing the form, submit your details.
- 3.OTP Verification: An OTP will be sent to your registered mobile number. Enter this OTP to proceed.
- **4.Login:** Use your registered mobile number and password to log in to your UDGAM account.
- 5.Additional OTP: Once you've entered your login details, you'll be prompted to enter another OTP for added
- 6.Enter Search Criteria: You'll

be directed to a page where you need to input the account holder's name and the bank's name. Additionally, choose at least one search criterion from options like PAN, Voter ID, Driving License Number, Passport Number, or Date of Birth.

Initiate Search: Click on the search button to trigger the system to retrieve and display your unclaimed deposits' details.

A big boost for transparency Activists in the city and across the country

The section talks about suo motu disclosure of information by the public authorities. The SC has directed the Central Information Commission and the State Information Commissions to ensure that public authorities follow the mandate of Section 4 of the RTI. The transparency Act that allows citizens to access timely information with penal provisions also states that the government provides to citizens as much information suo motu so that they do not have to file RTI applications.

Lack of suo motu disclosure led to an increase in the RTI applications. Seeking monitoring of suo motu disclosure was always a matter of concern with the commission stating that the head of public authority should be looking after its implementation and activists

"It is a wonderful order and takes the cause of transparency law to greater heights. It is not the responsibility of the commissions to act more vigilantly and duty of public authorities to provide as much information as possible under suo motu disclosure," said KC Jain, the petitioner on whose application the judgement came to be given by a three member bench headed by the chief justice of India.

"The best thing the SC order has done is to make it clear who is responsible for ensuring suo motu disclosure. They cannot get away with it," said Commodore Lokesh Batra (Retd.), who looks to take up issues with the Central Information Commission.

However, some were categorical in questioning the far reaching

The NMC also said that prescriptions should be legible and preferably written in capital letters to avoid misinterpretation. As far as possible, prescriptions should be typed and printed to avoid errors. A template has also been provided by the NMC that may be used for writing prescriptions rationally by doctors.

"In my career I have seen many doctors who prescribe medicines that are not available at the hospital pharmacy. This new move is welcomed as it will benefit lakhs of patients who are below the poverty line and cannot afford medicines," said a senior doctor at a civic-run hospital, who did not wished to named.

There are several rules and regulations but hardly anything is being followed as everyone knows there is no one to check this. Patients or their relatives also do not bother to take action as they lack of knowledge about rules and are already under stress when they visit hospitals, the doctor

Medical practitioners should prescribe only generic medicines available in the market and accessible to patients, NMC said, adding that hospitals and local pharmacies should stock generic drugs.

It also called for increased awareness about generic medicines and urged doctors to encourage patients to purchase drugs from Jan Aushadhi Kendras and other generic pharmacy outlets.
