2036 Summer Olympic Games

wo articles on the Money Page 10 of Free Press Journal, Mumbai edition dated 30th July 2024 drew my attention. Being a regular reader of FPJ for decades and also being trained as a free-lance journalist by former editor, FPJ, Shri A. B. Nair, I could not resist the temptation of going through the two articles in great detail and analyzing them.

I found that one article ("Is India Ready for Olympics? A Comprehensive Analysis by Tej Mandi") complemented the other ("Unleashing The Power of Philanthropy: A Roadmap for India's Ultra-Wealthy"). Yes, in fact, the questions in the first article on the top right hand had answers literally in the other article just a few inches below the first one.

MY ANALYSIS

Tej: In October 2023 Prime Minister Narendra Modi confirmed India's bid for the 2036 Summer Olympic Games while inaugurating the 141st session of the IOC in Mumbai. One of the biggest hurdles in bidding is the huge cost involved.

AIP-BCG: The number of UHNIs in India is expected to rise from 13,263 in 2023 to nearly 20,000 in 2028.

Tej: With India's recent informal bid announcement, the country could have about ten years to meticulously strategize and prepare for this monumental event ensuring lasting advantages and positive impact on nation's economy and global image.

AIP-BCG: The report said that growing desire to give among an increasing number of UHNIs, combined with the Knight Frank 2024 Wealth Report projection of a 50% growth in the number of UHNIs in India by 2028, the highest for any country, indicates that India can unlock substantial additional capital through even modest increases in philanthropic allocations.

The Way Forward

BCCI is the richest sports organization in the world. It has hosted many Cricketing events the world over. Its IPL has reached the global areas. It has been spending Hugh amounts on these and for which it has been getting much more as sponsors. CHS Installs City's Largest 300 KW Solar Power System, **Anticipates ₹70 Lakh Annual Savings** Bhalchandra Chorghade

This is probably for the first time that a housing society has managed to implement sustainable energy practices in Panvel that will help the society save thousands of units of electricity.

n what is claimed to be the biggest solar power system in Navi Mumbai, the Kalpataru **Riverside Housing** Society in Panvel has commissioned a system of 300 KW capacity. This is probably for the

first time that a housing society has managed to implement sustainable energy practices in Panvel that will help the society save thousands of units of electricity.

The project has been completed by Debt Engineering in a record time of three months at a cost of approximately Rs 1.20 Crore. The system is set to generate approximately 36,000 units of electricity per month and will result in an annual saving of around Rs 70 lakh on electricity bills.

The system was inaugurated by the former Leader of the House in Panvel Municipal Corporation and a resident of the society, Paresh Thakur. He asserted that this initiative will contribute towards a greener future of Panvel.

"The electricity bill of our society for common lights and lifts is approx Rs 3.5 lacs which comes to around Rs 42 lakh per

year. In terms of units, we consume 16,000 units per month. To reduce power bills and bring sustainable practices, we have installed a 300 KW solar system which should generate 36,000 units of electricity per month. With this system in place, we should save around Rs 70 lakh per year,"

Thakur said.

Maharashtra State Electricity **Distribution Company Ltd** (MSEDCL), rooftop solar power generation, has been helping cooperative housing societies to substantially cut their power bills. Electricity generated from rooftop solar projects in the housing society is used for various purposes like running elevators, water pumps and lighting stairs and parking lots.

The societies, companies or individuals wishing to install rooftop solar power facilities need to apply with the MSEDCL which then conducts a technical feasibility before approving the application. MMI

'No Country For Old People': Senior Citizens' Welfare Associations Express Discontent Over **Union Budget 2024** 🕼 Dhairya Gajara

s the annual union budget presented by the finance minister received mixed reactions from different sectors, the senior citizens welfare associations have expressed discontentment with this year's annual budget. Organisations said that the budget is a big setback for senior citizens claiming that it has totally neglected and ignored the elderly population of 149 million Indians.

Various groups working for the welfare of the senior citizens have expressed displeasure against the union budget especially after the Economic Survey report 2024 had strongly mentioned urgent need for structured elder care policies in the country. Additionally the Niti Aayog report of 2023 on Age Care also highlighted the urgent need to address issues of the ageing population in the area of Health Care, Social Engagement, Financial Stability and Security and Digital wellbeing.

Sailesh Mishra, founder president of Silver Innings organisation, said that the government has not considered any of the choices made by the senior citizen welfare groups since a long time. He added that the government did not consider any of their demands including restoration of railway concession for senior citizens, withdrawal of 18% GST on medical insurance, Ayushman Bharat scheme for all seniors, increased old age pension of Rs. 3000/- to all non taxpayer seniors, implementation of National Policy of Senior Citizens, National Dementia Policy for fast growing non curable brain disorder and passing the pending amendment bill of Senior Citizens Maintenance Act.



"Our finance minister and prime minister are themselves above the age of 65 and still they did not find it worthy to acknowledge the 60-plus population. We expect empathy and not sympathy from our lawmakers. We need concrete steps from the government with adequate budgetary allocations for safety, security, human rights and dignity of 149 million Senior Citizens," he added.

Prakash Naravan Borgaonkar, chief executive officer of the Aaji Care Sevak Foundation, working for the welfare of senior citizens from 2012, said that on one hand the government comes up with tirth yatra schemes for the elderlies but on the other hand it totally forgets them in the union budget. He said that the government has missed on bringing the constitution of the **Employment Bureau of Senior** Citizens. and much but they will expect that the government will spend around 9-10% of the budget on the welfare of senior citizens, who are projected to be around 11.5% of the total population of the country. There has been no census after 2011 and without the census of the population of senior citizens, we are just making policies in the dark," he added.

Vijay Aundhe, the vice president of the Federation for Senior Citizens Association of Maharashtra said that the budget is the worst budget ever for the senior citizens. He said that many parties had included senior citizen welfare schemes in their manifestos after the senior citizen associations released a manifesto before the Lok Sabha elections but

nothing reflected in the union budget.

"The budget is very disturbing for senior citizens like us as we were expecting that after taking so many facilities away from us, they will at least provide something in this budget but our hopes have been shattered. The earlier budgets were still better than this as this year we have been made to feel that they do not consider us in the budget. They are not taking care of such a huge population probably because they think we can not do anything. Now we will come back with our demands in a more vocal manner," he added.

Maharaj Krishna Raina, founder of Shehjaar Homes For Senior Citizens which has been running old-age homes in different parts of the country since 2005 said that the government has not considered senior citizens as they think it is a waste of money. He also expressed hope that once the voices of the senior citizens across the country will be unified, things will change for the better.

"We had expected that this budget would at least provide us the railway concession back which was stopped during Covid pandemic. Or the government could have launched some small scheme for our welfare but we see that there is a total indifference towards the senior citizens. They talk about the dignity of the senior citizens but they think it is a waste of money to allocate some part of the budget for us. We are told that we will be the third largest economy in a few years but nothing seems to be changing for us. Hopefully, we might see a unified voice of the seniors and things will change," he added. MMJ
